### "Multiliteracies: The New Plural of Literacy"

An eager sixth grade boy enters his classroom and acquires a copy of the class text from the book bin on the front shelf and carries it back to his desk. As indicated on the board, he opens his text to the table of contents and checks the page number of the assigned chapter. He traverses to that page and begins reading, paragraph by paragraph, page by page, exploring a wide variety of graphic and textual features in search of information.

Simultaneously, a sixth grade girl who is just as eager as her male classmate counterpart enters the same classroom and acquires a Chromebook from the class cart, a cart housed within the classroom for daily use. Having read the same chapter as the boy the previous day, she opens the Chromebook and—after troubleshooting the classroom wireless connections—logs into the class website to download her assignment. She completes her task and emails it from her student account to her teacher. In any given day, one hundred students just as these enter and exit my classroom—students who, being eleven and twelve year old sixth graders themselves, have birthdays embedded in their student records ending in "04" or "05." They are students who have never known an educational experience apart from one steeped in a blend of traditional methods of literacy instruction and literacy instruction stereotypical of that occurring in the twenty-first century.

Often, in today's popular culture, much debate occurs about what today's students need in a literacy curriculum. Traditionally, the definition of literacy was a simple as learning to read and write. However, it is obvious that this definition has shifted a great deal—more so, expanded. My role as a twenty-first century literacy teacher is not only presented with the challenges my predecessors faced previously, such as increasing students' reading comprehension and writing capabilities. Indeed, it is now compounded further with additional twenty-first century hurdles to overcome. With technology becoming more and more available in my classroom and in the classrooms of teachers like me across the country, accessibility of texts is an expanded issue. Literacy instruction is no longer as simple as whether or not a student can access a text through his or her reading abilities—rather, does a student have the technology skills necessary to log in to get to the text and task to hone their abilities in a multi-faceted, digital format?

Thus, no longer is literacy a single-framed definition; it has given way to *multiliteracies*. Alvermann and Moore (2013) outline this phenomenon: "Through a series of events leading up to the first decade of the twenty-first century, the notion of literacy with a big 'L' and single 'y', which referred generally to the kind of reading and writing that has gone on in schools . . . gave way to the plural form, literacies. . . . multiple literacies, situated literacies, [and] digital literacies" (p. 321). Today's students cannot simply be competent in accessing information from a text. They must be able to access the Internet independently, interpret use of mobile app software, make inferences from digital images from around the world—the list goes on.

What can contemporary teachers do but strike a balance? Indeed, traditional literacy skills are more relevant than ever; with pushes for college and career readiness, students who are younger and younger are expected to comprehend more challenging texts and articulate their comprehension in writing. Simultaneously, these students—who will compose the workforce of tomorrow—must have opportunities to use technology to support learning, often mastering the hidden curriculum of navigating the ins and outs of using such technology without a hitch. Certainly, the concept of multiliteracies is a complicated one. It is one, however, that isn't going away and will only continue to broaden. This is the type of complication that stretches our thinking and challenges us to find new ways each and every day to strike the balance between the traditional and the progressive. For my students, it is simply school.
