Kappa Campus, Xi Chapter, Nu State, California

Bichphuong Pham was presented a \$1,000 scholarship from Nu State, California to continue her dream of becoming a teacher. Her story is not like others that applied for a scholarship, for you see, "BP", as she is lovingly referred to by her Kappa sisters, was born in Vietnam after the Vietnam War. In the village where she lived there was a virus causing many children to die. She, too, was infected and her parents sold everything they had to pay for her hospital stay. The hospital was her home for many months, but even though the doctor's had given up, her parents had not. They decided to escape from Vietnam in search of a new life. America had everything they needed to start over. They tried to escape by boat, but were captured and punished. They hid in the forest, dodging bullets, and finally were able to get on a boat where they were confronted by pirates. They finally landed on the island of Malaysia.

Eight years of living in a camp in Malaysia in a hut without a door or windows, with many other families in the same room, left BP unable to read or write, only able to speak Vietnamese. She claims they looked like "fish in a can" as they slept. Each day the family was issued four tickets for food. BP took the bucket to get the food for the family. Every day they prayed that someone in America would sponsor them. Seven years had passed when the family was forced to leave the hut, and told that if they needed food or medical attention they would need to "sign" to return to Vietnam. They knew if they returned they would certainly be put to death. Finally, without another choice, they decided to return, knowing they would be put into military educational camps and possibly tortured to death. BP was placed in school, where she recalls being punished because she was slow to understand. Her parents were poor and could not pay the teachers the "tip" they expected. They lived on rice and water. Finally, they were accepted into the American Refugee Program.

Beginning a new life again, in America, she was enrolled in the sixth grade. She did not know a single word of English. However, this time the teachers were "kind, pretty, and did not use physical punishment." The teacher gave her math problems to solve, and solve them she did! She shyly began to speak English. She found it interesting that people could understand her when she spoke English. She finished High School, and went on to get her Bachelor's Degree. She is entering the credentialing program to become a teacher. Her wish is that "one day, I can give back to this country". She feels that it is by the Grace of God that she has come this far.
