

Finally, Fall is in the air! It has been a long hot record breaking summer. The National Executive Committee and Executive Director Marilyn Bridges have been extremely busy dealing with the aftermath of storm damage to Kappa Headquarters since May.

It was wonderful to visit with State Presidents as a group at the National Executive Committee and State Presidents' Fall Meeting in Tulsa. We all worked very hard to create a **Five-Year Strategic Plan** for Kappa Kappa Iota. Dr. Mitzy Johnson-Mills (MU/MS) facilitated this event at our meeting (Picture Below). State Presidents learned about

Parliamentary Procedures from Parliamentarian Sue Hagan (Upsilon/SC), President-Elect Brenda Morrison (Rho/NC) conducted an informative and interesting interactive workshop about **Philanthropy**, Second Vice President Phyllis Thomas (Eta/LA) presented a workshop about **Membership**, and Executive Director Marilyn Bridges provided information regarding the **IRS 990N-E-Postcard Filing Status** for each state.



Parliamentarian Sue Hagan is working with the National Executive Committee to develop a **Five-Year Financial Plan** based upon dues membership. Sue presented the State Presidents with data analysis and the impact on our financial standing. The National Executive Committee also reviewed how the **National Dues of \$40 per person was spent**. The data based on current budget figures reflects that **52%** going towards Executive Director and temporary part-time help salaries, taxes and benefits. Another **27%** is spent

on NEC Meetings, Convention Expenses, and Travel. The balance of **21%** covers the costs for administration and headquarters expenses. This was presented to the State Presidents in a pie graph.

It was an enjoyable time sharing information, ideas, and concerns during our meeting. The "Twisted Rockettes" and National Executive Committee along with guests still had time to enjoy a "Night out at Talley's Diner" on Friday evening where we dined on burgers, French fries, and milk shakes at the 50's style diner. Saturday night we enjoyed a buffet of pizza, soft drinks, and salad at Mazzio's Pizzeria.

My Kappa rotation state travel started with a trip to meet with State President Michele Phillips and members of Epsilon/AR on October 11-12, 2019. The following weekend I will meet with Patrice Smith and members of Delta/TX. In December, I will visit Pat Matthews and members

of Lambda State/GA, in January you will find me in sunny Florida with State President Jennifer Avellino and members of Xi State/FL, in April I will visit with Judith Medlin and members of Upsilon State/SC, and in May, it is on to meet with Stacey Hamner and members of Zeta State/MO. 2020 Pre and Post Tour Previews

The 2020 National Convention begins on Monday, June 21 with the Pre Tour offered prior to the Opening First General Assembly and Welcome Reception. The Pre Tour features historical stops in both Memphis and Dyess, Arkansas where we will have this convention's first taste of music history. Mississippi will be highlighted in the Post Tour which will depart for its first day of fun rolling down the Delta Blues Trail on Friday, June 26. The Post Tour will return to the Marriott Memphis East for an overnight stay before completing our Post Tour frolic with a visit to the home of Jerry Lee Lewis and a trip to Tupelo, MS to visit the birthplace of Elvis Presley on Saturday, June 27. The Kappa Convention Hotel Group Rate will be honored the entire Post Tour weekend.

<u>Pre Tour, Monday, June 21 (8am-4pm)</u> The Pre Tour is all about experiencing the historical events in and around Memphis from feeling the power of the Civil Rights movement and those who led



around Memphis from feeling the power of the Civil Rights movement and those who led that fight to exploring the historic **Dyess Colony**, the Arkansas **boyhood home of Johnny Cash**, a man who fought for human rights in his own way. Picked up in a Back Beats Tour bus at our hotel, our day will begin immediately with a working **Memphis Musician** as our entertainment and our tour guide for the first hour of the day. Visiting the **National Civil Rights Museum** located in the **Lorraine Motel** is our first stop and it promises to be eye-opening, sobering, and inspiring as we examine each

important step of the Civil Rights movement. A wonderful lunch will be followed by a trip into Arkansas to explore the **Historic Dyess Colony** which was created to aid in the nation's economic recovery after the Great Depression. Johnny Cash's family was just one of the families who got a fresh start in Arkansas. After a quick stop for a snack and a little shopping, we will return to the hotel in time for the Opening Session. Post Tour, Friday and Saturday, June 26-27 The Post Tour is sure to be filled with music and memories!



On Friday, we are headed down to the Crossroads! As we travel, we will stop at historic markers along the Mississippi Delta Blues Trail like **Dockery Farms**, the place regarded as the wellspring of the Delta Blues sound, as well as the proclaimed site of the famous **Devil's Crossroads** in Clarksdale, MS, home of Blues. A little further down the trail, we will tour the **GRAMMY Museum** in Cleveland, MS and then enjoy lunch and some window shopping in the charming downtown area before heading to Indianola to visit **B.B. King's Blues Museum**. Visiting **Peter's Pottery** in Mound Bayou- where Mississippi mud becomes art- will round out the afternoon. Moving toward

Memphis, we will enjoy dinner and live blues music in Clarksdale at **Morgan Freeman's Blues Club**, Ground Zero before returning for an overnight stay at the Memphis Marriott. Saturday morning, we will again head to Mississippi - Nesbit, MS to tour the home of **Jerry Lee Lewis**. Continuing south to Tupelo, MS, we will enjoy a traditional Southern lunch at **Romey's Grocery** before heading over to visit the **Elvis Presley Birthplace and Museum**. We will be-bop on over to **Johnnie's Drive-In**, a favorite of Elvis' for a milkshake or piece of pie and might even get to sit in the "Elvis Booth"! Before returning to the Memphis Marriott, we will stop in at **Tupelo Hardware** where Gladys Presley bought her son his first guitar. What a great adventure! (app. \$90)

Martin, Johnny, Jerry Lee, Elvis, great food and the blues – between our Pre and Post tours, it just doesn't get any better than that! Make plans to join us for inspiration, fun, and frolic.
