Membership Challenge

Are you ready for a challenge? A new membership program is being created to help increase membership in Kappa Kappa lota. The program is simple, but the rewards are great for both the new member and the current Kappa.

To accept this challenge, all one must do is adopt a Kappa for a year. When one adopts a new member, she/he will pay the membership dues for the adoptee for one year and will mentor the adoptee. After the first year, the membership dues will be the responsibility of the adoptee.

Our goal is to increase membership to 2,025 members in 2025. We are asking each State to increase their membership by a minimum of 5 (five) new members.

To reach this goal, we need everyone's help. Adopt a new member and show her/him the benefits of being a Kappa. While mentoring this new adoptee, you will develop a new friendship and connection. Maybe you would like to challenge another Kappa to adopt someone, too. Make this a friendly rivalry to see who can adopt more than one new member. Or, ask your State President to issue a challenge to a sister state to determine which State can gain the most new adoptees!

Each member who adopts a Kappa will receive a certificate and a special pin at the National Convention.

States who reach the goal of a minimum of 5 (five) new members will receive a certificate at the National Convention in Chattanooga, TN, as well as a special surprise.

Let's all do our part to "Raise the Curve" by adopting a Kappa! Let's meet or exceed our membership goal of 2,025 members in 2025!

2025 National Convention Tour Information Preview

2025 National Convention begins on Monday, June 23, 2025, with the Pre-Tour offered prior to the Opening First General Assembly and Welcome Reception. The Pre-Tour features a visit to the Great Smoky Mountain Heritage Center. Members will learn about the culture and history of the Cherokee Native Americans. During the week there will be daily tours to explore the history and diversity of Chattanooga. The Mabel Caldwell Post Tour will depart on Friday June 27, 2025, to Nashville "Music City" experience. The post tour will return on Sunday June 29, 2025, to The Read House for an overnight stay at the convention rate of \$144 plus taxes. Book your room in advance.

Pre-Tour, Monday, June 23, 2025 (7:45am-4:30pm), The Pre -Tour to Smoky Mountain Heritage Center includes interactive 30- minute activities Blow darts, Basket weaving, and Candle-making. Museum/Village Tour- 45 minutes to 1 hour. There will be active demonstrations of hearth cooking or a loom in operation. **Lunch at your own expense** will be at the Apple Valley Café in Townsend. Participants will order from the menu. If time permits, there will be shopping at the General Store next door. We will return to the hotel in time for the Opening Session. Price \$70 per person based on 40 people.

Post-Tour, Friday through Sunday, June 27-29, 2025 The Mabel Caldwell Post Tour will travel to "Music City" Nash-ville, TN with stops along the way. The tour will gather at 10:00am EST to load the bus for a 10:30am EST departure. Mabel Caldwell Post Tour price per person is \$720 for singles, \$540 for doubles in one room, \$450 for 3 or more in one room. The tour price is based upon 40 people.

Friday- Kappas on this tour should have a leisurely breakfast Friday morning at the Read House or at The Innside Restaurant on Chestnut Street on their own.

1st Stop: Miss Mary Bobo's. Lunch cost is included in the total post-tour price. The gift shop is available. 2nd Stop: Arrive at Opryland Convention Center where participants will be free to wander, shop, and eat a snack on their own.

3rd Stop: Check-in at Alexis Hotel for two (2) night stay. The Group Rate room cost is included in the overall tour price for this two- night stay. Do not contact the hotel directly. We will provide them with a list of members for the tour. Free hot breakfast. Free Wi-fi.

4th Stop: Ole Red's, Honky-Tonk time in Nashville! Dinner on your own is to be ordered from the menu. There will be entertainment, and dancing. A bar is available.

Saturday- Begin the day with breakfast at Alexis Hotel.

1st Stop: Tennessee State Museum. Free wheelchairs and portable stools are available.

2nd Stop: Monell's, great southern food in historic Nashville setting. Their famous fried chicken, meats of the day, hot southern vegetables, salads, drinks, dessert, and biscuits are served family **style lunch on your own**.

3rd Stop: Alexis Hotel to freshen up.

4th Stop: Opry Mills. Members may make their choice of an **early dinner on your own** from the many restaurants available. **Departure at 5:30pm** to go to the Grand Ole Opry.

5th Stop: Grand Ole Opry Show. The building is handicapped accessible and accessible seating is available.

Wheelchairs are free on a first-come, first-served basis.

6th Stop: Return to the Alexis Hotel.

Sunday- Start the day with breakfast at the Alexis Hotel and checkout before leaving for the final tour day.

1st Stop: Country Music Hall of Fame.

2nd Stop: Cracker Barrel for lunch and shopping.

3rd Stop: The Lodge Cast Iron Museum and shopping.

4th Stop: The Read House unload luggage and check in for an overnight stay at the convention rate of \$144 plus taxes.
